

Safe Parishioners - Secure Churches

Following the widespread emotional reactions to the Supreme Court leak and decision overturning Roe-v-Wade, and calls on social media for possible demonstrations and disruptions at Catholic churches, the Diocese of Manchester hired **Blue-U.com**, a security firm specializing in secure premises and training, to provide risk evaluations and basic security protocols for every Catholic church in New Hampshire, and all at Diocese expense.

While we have not experienced any incidents at our church here in Belmont, it was thought prudent to avail the free Diocesan security resources to conduct "walk-through" evaluations of our churches, provide some practical security tips and some basic training of Ushers/Greeters - - to keep our parishioners and visitors safe at mass and preclude any untoward occurrences in church or on church property. Hence, all but main church doors will be locked at start of mass to eliminate any troublesome entry, but yet enable exit at any time.

Being aware of our surroundings and acknowledging the possibility of problems arising from social activism or unrest, even as slight as they might be, is a good first step in personal as well as group safety and security.

PRE-EMINENT ISSUE FOR CATHOLICS

The United States Conference of Catholic Bishops (USCCB) reaffirmed that stopping abortion is a "pre-eminent priority" of the Catholic Church. It is listed as the number one issue in the revised edition of the spiritual manual "Forming Consciences for Faithful

Citizenship," the U.S. bishops' voting guide for Catholics. (Source: Catholic News Agency)

ENVIRONMENTAL IMPACT OF ABORTION PILLS

In addition to the health risks posed to women who take the chemical abortion pills, there is also an impact on our environment's water supply. Chemical abortions now make up 63% of all abortions, making it the most common form of abortion in America. This type of abortion results in toxic chemicals and human remains entering our water supply through sewer systems. Water treatment plants do not treat for either. These environmental concerns are turning people, especially young voters, against chemical abortion pills and against the EPA's lax policies. (Source: Students for Life)

Fifth Sunday of Easter



My friend and fellow pastor, Father Paul, noticed unsightly, overgrown trees near his parish church. He asked the maintenance crew to cut back the growth, which they happily did, telling him the trees would be much healthier and even fuller after a good pruning. A

few days later, Father Paul received a letter from an irate man in the neighborhood who wrote, "Jesus would <u>never</u> prune trees like that. He loves trees, unlike you."

I suspect that the neighbor was not familiar with this week's Gospel in which Jesus says of his Father, **"He removes every branch in me that bears no fruit. Every branch that bears fruit he prunes to make it bear more fruit"** (John 15:2) I don't mean to pick too much on that fellow. He was perhaps ignorant of arboriculture. But I'd wager his main confusion was the pruning and removing quality of God's love. That confusion afflicts us all to some degree, doesn't it? It is just so darn easy to react negatively when God cuts something out of our lives and assume it's not his work at all. In the moment, all we see is the loss, and not the loving desire for future flourishing.

The cross is the great pruning of Christ's body. Jesus' rising is the brand-new growth. It is God's promise to us that all the painful pruning in life is leading us somewhere beautiful. What has been cut back or out in your life? A friend, an opportunity, a sense of certainty, a job, health, a relationship? This week, offer those dry branches to the one who lovingly prunes us in order to make our lives burst with verdant growth.



1951: January 8 – Joint installation of officers of Holy Name Society and Altar Society.

January 28 – Saturday, 8pm – Parish Hall – Mardi Gras Party. All Parishioners welcome including high school students. Prizes for the best and most original costumes. music, entertainment, refreshments.

February 8 – Confraternity class on Friday at 11am – tournament.

April 2 – Parish Hall will be open to Confraternity Class and their guests on Monday and Wednesday evenings during April –Chaperoned by members of the Holy Name and Altar Societies.

April 15 – Parish Hall – Kitchen Shower. All women and young ladies of the Parish are invited.

April 29 – Holy Year Jubilee visits to four churches with Fr. Massicotte leading the group.

May 20 – Monday – 6pm – Start painting the church.

May 27 - Painting of the church continues.

June 3 – Tuesday, 7:30pm – Parish Hall – meeting of the Parish committee for the lawn party. Raffle tickets will be distributed to each family. Communion for the graduates next Sunday at 8am Mass.

Lawn Pary – sorry weather only permitted one evening. Lawn party is postponed until Thursday – Saturday, July 12, 13, and 14.

July 29 – Next Sunday: Services – Mass will be held in our new Chapel at Winnisquam at 7 and 10am..Bishop came to visit the Chapel yesterday and was pleased with it. Open air bingo on grounds of new the Chapel in Winnisquam every Saturday at 8pm (weather permitting).

August 12 at 11am Mass. Dedication and blessing of the new Chapel of the Immaculate Heart of Mary in Winnisquam by the Bishop of the Diocese. NB People stay outside the church for prayers said by the Bishop and enter the church after the Bishop (except in case of rain). There will be three Masses – 7, 10, 11am at the Chapel now through Labor Day.

August 15 – Wednesday, Feast of the Assumption – Day of Obligation for all. Masses in Belmont at 5:30am, 7:30am; Chapel at 8 and 9am. No seat offering will be taken, but there will be a collection for the Sanctuary and Altar.

August 22 – Feast of the Immaculate Heart of Mary – Patron Saint of the Chapel in Winnisquam. Mass there at 8am. No masses at Saint Joseph.

August 23, 24, 25 – Lawn party was a real success notwithstanding poor weather.

October 14 – All parishioners are invited to participate in a pilgrimage to the La Salette Shrine in Enfield. It is sponsored by the Parish societies. Departure after the 10am Mass. May bring lunch.

Under the direction of Father Massicotte, the women of the Parish organized themselves as the ALTAR and ROSARY SOCIETY. Mrs. John (Claire) Moynihan was their first president.

The Altar and Rosary Society: notes from the Diary of Mrs. Yvonne Vaillancourt: "There were 48 members registered." In her diary, she wrote about their putting on "Church spaghetti suppers with price of \$1.00 per person and children under 12 half price." The meal consisted of spaghetti and meat balls, French bread and butter, apple pie and ice cream, and coffee.
